Winter Bird Survey 2023-24

Courtyard Farm, Ringstead

The Courtyard Farm Winter Bird Survey 2023-24 was conducted by John Williamson between November 2023 and February 2024 using the same methodology as previous Winter Bird Surveys.

The farm was surveyed on two separate visits during each of the months November 2023 to February 2024 by walking transects. During those visits the numbers of birds using each field were recorded. Those bird species recorded in any number on a regular basis form the bulk of the results, as presented later in this report, but for completeness a full list of all species recorded during the survey work is also included.

The field usage was also recorded for each of the clearly defined fields on the farm and the results as presented to determine any correlation between field content, and bird species and numbers utilising those fields. Flocks of passerines using feeding stations were also recorded.

A total of five suspended tube feeders are provided on the farm for passerines. Various finches and tits benefit from these. The tube feeders are located mainly just within the woodland edge, where it adjoins field crops, though seed provision is often erratic with just the feeder nearest the farm buildings constantly stocked. Also, two extensive areas of wild-bird seed are sown on the farm to benefit small seed-eating birds and Grey Partridges throughout the winter. Occasionally supplementary winter feeding within the wild-bird seed-strips is undertaken. This is intended to fill the 'hungry gap' of late-winter and early-spring.


November opened with overcast skies and spells of prolonged and heavy rain from the south-west on a deep low moving across southern England causing localised flooding throughout the county. The first frosts occurred around mid-month but generally changeable conditions continued into the third week with a few bright days but plenty of showers and periods of heavier rain arrived on the often blustery south-westerly airflow. Daytime temperatures reached 10-11°C on several days. A return to a northerly dominated airflow by the end of the month saw the onset of a colder spell but daytime temperatures remained at c.6°C.

December commenced with a sharp drop in temperatures, light but bitterly cold north-easterly winds and the first snow showers. Overnight temperatures plummeted to -5°C. However, airflow soon returned to a south-westerly with blustery winds and continued spells of heavy rain causing localised flooding. By mid-month daytime temperatures had risen to 10-11°C, with overnight temperatures remaining well above freezing preventing any serious frosts. Blustery south-westerly winds prevailed with frequent spells of rain.

The New Year dawned mild, bright and sunny, but with a brisk westerly wind keeping temperatures down to 8° C. By mid-January a high pressure was dominating with variable, but often brisk, north-westerly to north-easterly winds. Subsequently temperatures plummeted to -5° C overnight as the first real snow flurries of the winter fell. The cold spell was short-lived and a return to blustery south-westerly winds brought milder and more settled weather with daytime temperature reaching $10-11^{\circ}$ C by month end.

February continued with mild, settled conditions and daytime temperatures reaching 14 early in the month with a predominantly moderate south-westerly airflow. Precipitation increased during the first week with heavy rainfall causing more local flooding as temperatures remained in the mid-teens °C and airflow was once again dominated by blustery south-westerlies.

Full Systematic List

All bird species recorded on Winter Bird Survey 2023-24

Grey Partridge: all birds recorded – see tabulated results.

Red-legged Partridge: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Common Pheasant: all birds recorded – see tabulated results.

Moorhen: two adults and at least one immature were present on the Paddock Pond on November 4th and 19th but with Paddock Pond fully frozen on December 2nd there was no sign of any of these birds. Despite the Paddock Pond being frozen on January 16th at least one adult Moorhen remained nearby.

Pink-footed Goose: up to 1500 birds were recorded arriving from the north-west early on November 4th, alighting to feed to the south of the farm. On November 19th several flocks totalling 3750 flew north-east over the farm heading towards the Scolt Head Island roost. On December 21st flocks totalling c.1250 headed low south-west over the southern section of the farm. On February 3rd wave after wave of birds was noted heading north-east over the farm early morning, perhaps totalling c.2500 birds.

Dark-bellied Brent Goose: a flock of 28 flew low and purposefully south-west over Bush Breck on January 1st.

Greylag Goose: two flew low west over Barn Breck on November 19th.

Mallard: for the most part remains elusive during the winter period. Two males and 2 females were seen on Paddock Pond on November 4th. A pair was on Paddock Pond on February 3rd, when 4 males and a female were seen in flight low to the west over Fourteen Acres. On February 19th a group of 6 males and a female remained on Paddock Pond

Red Kite: now an apparently ever-present feature of North-west Norfolk farmland; up to 3 were circling low over the farm on November 4th and 4 were overhead on November 19th. On December 21st one was over Cherry Trees at first light with another over Two Fourteen Acres later the same morning. On January 1st one was drifting over Smith's Piece and another was perched in a tree in the hedgerow between Bell's Charity and Upper Whins. On January 16th one was over Bottom Breck. One was drifting slowly south over the farm on February 3rd when it joined a second bird over Landing Strip before continuing south.

Marsh Harrier: again relatively scarce in the survey area this winter: a female flew low south over Cherry Trees on November 19th and a male flew south over Barn Breck on December 21st. A female was hunting over Barn Breck on January 1st and was likely the same bird seen heading east over Lower Whins a little later the same morning. On February 3rd a female was hunting over Hatchet Breck early morning.

Sparrowhawk: relatively scarce throughout the period. A female was hunting hedgerows alongside Black Hean on November 19th. A female was hunting amongst the hawthorns on Ringstead Common on December 2nd. A male was hunting along the green lane to the east of Upper Whins on January 1st. A male and female were soaring high over Black Hean on February 3rd before drifting south.

Common Buzzard: recorded in small numbers on each visit during the survey period. This species remains the most commonly recorded raptor on the farm during winter, though Red Kite is fast approaching the same frequency. A minimum of 4 birds were soaring overhead on November 4th, with the same number noted on November 19th. On the warm, breezy morning of February 3rd at least 6 were soaring over the farm, with 3 together over North Wood.

Kestrel: a female was hunting over Bottom Breck on November 4th. On November 19th a male was perched in the trees on the south side of Ringstead Common, and presumably the same male was around the north side of Ringstead Common on December 2nd. A male was hunting over the headland on the western edge of Bush Breck on December 21st. On January 1st a female was perched in the hedgerow on the north side of Jay's Field, and was presumably the same female seen flying into Ringstead Common later the same morning. On February 3rd a female was perched in the hedgerow between Fourteen Acres and Lambert Hill Breck.

Golden Plover: all birds recorded – see tabulated results.

Lapwing: all birds recorded - see tabulated results. In addition to those recorded in the tables a flock of 125 flew west over Bell's Charity on November 19th, and 40 flew north-west over Hatchet Breck on February 3rd.

Snipe: unusually, one was flushed from the centre of Lower Whins on January 1st and continued strongly north until out of sight and another was flushed from Lambert Hill Breck on February 3rd before flying off strongly south.

Woodcock: first birds recorded on November 4th when 2 were flushed from the scrub on the west endo of Dark Wood. On November 19th one was flushed from Ringstead Common and another was flushed from Jessica's Wood. An apparent influx was noted with the advent of colder weather when a total of 9 were flushed on December 2nd, including 4 from Jessica's Wood, 2 from Bush Breck and 2 from the hedgerow between Landing Strip and Black Hean. On December 21st a total of 6 were seen: 3 were flushed from stubble and clover on Home Twenty, with 3 others located on Ringstead Common, in the headland on Bush Breck at the base of hedgerow between landing Strip and Black Hean. On January 1st singles were flushed from Jessica's Wood and beneath the hedgerow between Landing Strip and High Dual. An apparent influx ahead of the hard weather mid-January saw a total of 9 flushed from stubble, hedgerows bases and woodland on January 16th. On February 3rd a total of 7 were flushed with 4 of those flushed from the weedy growth on Home Twenty.

Curlew: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Black-headed Gull: see tabulated results - groups of over 5 recorded.

Common Gull: see tabulated results – groups of over 5 recorded.

Herring Gull: see tabulated results – all birds recorded.

Lesser Black-backed Gull: remains very scarce since the departure of the pig-rearing units. Single immatures were noted on Upper Whins of January 16th and on Lower Whins on February 17th.

Great Black-backed Gull: as always, this species remains scarce: a single immature was on Upper Whins on November 19th.

Feral Pigeon: Numbers apparently reduced with just 4-5 birds present during the early part of the winter period.

Stock Dove: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Woodpigeon: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Collared Dove: all birds recorded – see tabulated results.

Barn Owl: a single record of one in flight over Home Piece on the morning of February 3rd.

Tawny Owl: a daytime calling bird heard in the vicinity of the cattle barn north of the Burnham Road on November 19^{th} . On December 2^{nd} one was calling from the oaks in Dark Wood at dawn.

Green Woodpecker: quite scarce throughout the winter period. One was calling from Wharton's Belt on November 19th and one was seen in flight across Home Piece on January 1st.

Great Spotted Woodpecker: remains generally unobtrusive during winter: one was calling on flight as it flew east over North Wood on November 19th. On February 3rd one was drumming from the west end of Wharton's Belt.

Skylark: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Meadow Pipit: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Pied Wagtail: fair numbers recorded in autumn. A total of 13 were seen on November 4th when birds were recorded on Cherry Trees (5), Black Hean (2), Landing Strip (2), Smith's Piece (2) and around the farm buildings (2). Up to 7 were feeding in the silage store north of the cattle barn near the Burnham Road on November 19th, when 2 were also around the farm buildings. On December 2nd numbers were much reduced with just 2 seen around the farm buildings. Just 3 were noted on January 1st with all 3 feeding on plough on Ten Acres. A pair was feeding around the farm buildings on February 3rd.

Wren: encountered in small numbers during each visit, predominantly recorded in woodland, hedgerow and deciduous scrub.

Dunnock: again there was no evidence of any obvious interruption to the long-term decline. It was encountered on all visits, predominantly in woodland edges, hedgerow and scrub, often favouring the area around the gardens of the farm building complex and on Ringstead Common.

Robin: recorded on all visits in small numbers but with a clear increase recorded in mid-November following an arrival of Continental immigrants. It was recorded mainly in woodland, scrub and hedgerows. As usual song was recorded for throughout the entire winter period, continuing into early spring.

Blackbird: a sharp rise in numbers early-November following a strong immigration of Continental birds. Around 110 were recorded in hedgerows, scrub and woodland edge on 4th. By mid-November numbers had stabilised somewhat with c.100 present on 19th. Numbers remained high into early December, with perhaps another wave or Continental immigrants swelling the local population when 130 were noted. Subsequently numbers were lower as birds dissipated throughout the local area. The first birds were singing on the morning of February 3rd.

Fieldfare: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Song Thrush: good numbers present in hedgerows, scrub and woodland during early November when c.35 present on 4th, with another 17 noted flying south during the day. One was in sub-song in North Wood on January 1st. At least 3 birds were noted singing on the warm, breezy morning of February 3rd with songsters in Wharton's Belt, The hedgerow between Ten Acres and Barn Breck and in woodland abutting the western edge of Eighteen Acres.

Redwing: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Mistle Thrush: remains quite scarce. Maximum recorded was just 2 on Upper Whins on January 1st. One was in full song from the east end of Wharton's Belt on January 16th, with perhaps the same male in song from the Green Lane bisecting Wharton's Belt on February 3rd.

Goldcrest: again scarce throughout the survey period: two were noted in scrub on Ringstead Common on November 19th, and one was seen in North Wood on January 1st.

Long-tailed Tit: encountered on most visits. The largest flock in early winter numbered 8 birds and was seen on December 2^{nd} in the hedgerow on the west side of Bush Breck. Two flocks were noted on January 1^{st} when 10 were in the hedgerow west of the cow barn, and 8 were with a mixed tit flock in the hedgerow on the east side of Lower Whins.

Coal Tit: small numbers remain on the farm. It is noted on most visits, most often in conifers and deciduous evergreens. Maximum recorded was 2 on January 1st in Dark Wood, and on January 16th when 2 were visiting the suspended feeder adjacent to the farm buildings.

Blue Tit: recorded on all visits in small numbers; largest group was 14 noted amidst a mixed tit flock feeding on a suspended feeder adjacent to the farm buildings on January 16th. This specie remains the most numerous small woodland bird species on the farm.

Great Tit: remaining less abundant than the above species but still present on all visits. Maximum of 7 recorded on the in and around the farm building complex on February 19th.

Jay: recorded in small numbers on all visits. A flock of 4 was noted on Ringstead Common on January 1st with 2-3 recorded on most visits. Usually most visible during late autumn when the practice of burying acorns on open land revels its presence, this species was also noted regularly in hedgerows in late-winter and early spring.

Magpie: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Jackdaw: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Rook: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Carrion Crow: relatively small numbers seen on each visit, usually in low single figures and less numerous with the cessation of pig rearing on the farm; largest count 4 on Black Hean on February 17th.

Starling: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Chaffinch: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Greenfinch: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Goldfinch: a small flock of 8 was feeding on the edge of Ringstead Common and Smith's Piece on November 4th. On January 16th a small flock of 6 were feeding in the hedgerow trees on the west side of Horse Breck, and 2 were visiting the suspended feeder adjacent to the farm buildings. A flock of 8 were with Chaffinches on the east side of Hatchet Breck on February 3rd.

Linnet: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.

Bullfinch: again, generally rather scarce during the survey period when just 2 were noted: a male on Ringstead Common on January 1st and a male again in scrub adjacent to Cherry Trees on February 3rd.

Yellowhammer: all birds recorded - see tabulated results.



Results

To complement the full list of species recorded in the previous section the results of selected species from the Courtyard Farm Winter Bird Survey 2023-24 are presented in this section in tabulated format. The dates of the eight visits, spaced as evenly throughout the survey period as weather and availability would allow, are indicated below:

The criteria for the minimum size flock or loose gathering of each species is highlighted in the full species list in the previous section. For example, due to the increased scarcity of species such as Greenfinch, Chaffinch and Yellowhammer, all individuals of these species are now recorded.

In a few cases, particularly towards the end of the survey with the onset of spring, zero counts do not necessarily mean a lack of presence for a species but may relate more to that species having abandoned its winter flocking habit to form small groups or potential breeding pairs.

Some selected results are also presented later in this section in block chart format to illustrate changing numbers within certain species on the farm as autumn arrival and spring departures progress.

In association with the selected results referred to above, the content of each field on the farm during the survey period is also presented in tabulated form, whether this is standing stubble, nitrogen replacement fertiliser crops, permanent grassland, livestock or a combination of any of these.

Chart 1 – Red-legged Partridge, Grey Partridge and Common Pheasant

Grey Partridge were present throughout the winter period, but only in low numbers. Both cereal stubble and young sprouting cereal crops remain the preferred habitat. Red-legged Partridge and Common Pheasant were recorded in quite similar numbers to the previous winter period with perhaps a slight increase in the former and a slight decrease in the latter. The effect of the cessation of gamebird releases has now apparently levelled out.




Chart 2 – Lapwing, Golden Plover and Curlew

Both Lapwing and Golden Plover remain somewhat erratic in appearance but once again a lateautumn/early-winter peak was evident. A second mid-winter peak indicated an arrival of Continental birds into the county as a result of a short cold snap. Curlew numbers remain low. Given the counts of Lapwing and Golden Plover, this is most likely as a result of milder winters providing ample feeding opportunities on coastal grazing marshes and saltmarshes.




Chart 3 - Black-headed Gull, Common Gull and Herring Gull

Overall, both Black-headed Gull and Common Gull numbers were notably up on the previous winter period, with the former peaking at 358 and the latter at 713. A notable mid-winter arrival of Common Gulls was the result of the short, cold snap in mid-January. Herring Gull numbers remain both low and erratic without the attraction of the pig-rearing units.




Chart 4 – Stock Dove, Woodpigeon and Collared Dove

On three occasions during the survey period (twice in early-winter) counts of Woodpigeon exceeded 650, peaking at 824 in early-spring. Numbers had generally recovered to levels similar to those in the winter of 2021-22. Stubble undersown with clover remains a favoured habitat, as does spring plough. Stock Doves remain scarce; recorded on five out of eight visits they peaked at 20 in early-spring. Collared Doves are only normally recorded around the farm buildings and were absent until early-January when a single count of 6 was made.




Chart 5 – Jackdaw and Rook

The pattern of occurrence of Jackdaws remains similar to previous winter periods, though numbers appear to be in continued slow decline, usually peaking in late-winter/early-spring. Late-autumn numbers were once again particularly low. Rooks remain somewhat erratic in appearance on the farm, though the suggestion remains that they may be increasing in numbers. They were surprisingly absent in late-autumn, but present in good numbers in early-spring when a peak of 52 was recorded on plough.




Chart 6 – Yellowhammer and Skylark

Yellowhammer numbers were further reduced on the previous winter period, peaking at just 25 in mid-winter. Overall, Skylark numbers were quite similar to the previous winter period, but with a larger peak of 145 recorded in late-autumn. Whilst milder winter periods may be contributing to this decline, the lack of winter food for granivores is doubtless the major contributing factor in these continued disappointing results.




Chart 7 – Starling

A late autumn arrival, peaking at 267 in late-November, was up on the previous winter but still of very modest proportions. Numbers then fell away quite dramatically as incoming Continental immigrants moved on to wintering grounds. A second peak of 299 in mid-January was associated with the short, cold snap during that period.




Chart 8 – Fieldfare and Redwing

Data suggested a rather better winter period for both Fieldfare and Redwing. Both species peaked first in late-autumn when 148 Fieldfares and 98 Redwing were recorded. As is often the case, numbers of both species fell as they moved inland and south-west through the UK, before a second peak in of 151 Fieldfare and 148 Redwing in response to the short, cold snap encountered in mid-January. A further small peak of Fieldfare in early-February suggested an early spring departure to the north-east as a result of the un-seasonally warm spring temperatures.




Chart 9 – Meadow Pipit

Numbers were not dissimilar to those recorded during the 2022-23 winter period and represents a reasonably good showing by this species. Numbers peaked at 89 in late-autumn and with no prolonged hard weather period to speak of, remained at a reasonable level throughout the winter period. The absence in early-spring is perhaps a result of reduce3d numbers during the cold snap in mid-January, but perhaps also indicative of an early spring departure in response to warm February temperatures.





Chart 10 – Chaffinch and Linnet

The data suggests a reversal of fortunes for these two granivores on the previous winter period. Numbers of both species remain relatively poor. Chaffinch peaked in late-autumn at just 67, with no obvious influx of Continental immigrants in autumn. Linnets however, peaked at 156 in late-autumn but fell away quite quickly as winter progressed. Despite the milder winter weather in recent years, with little in the way of winter food for these species they tend to dissipate quickly in winter.



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
